SPB1 1986 preseason forecast from Street&Schmoody's Baseball Publications

Using the most recent up-to-date supercomputer analytics with a credibility interval (a measurement of precision) that outdistances the accuracy of lunar landing software, baseball's premier publication, Street&Schmoody's 1986 Baseball Yearbook has produced, for their loyal readership, another rousing preview for the upcoming exciting newly reformulated SPB1 1986 season.

1986 marks the 33rd season of SPB1 and also a radical redesign of the league structure and playoffs format. SPB1 has decided to forgo the divisional format and instead has reestablished the fan popular two separate league (consisting of eleven teams each) format which ran from 1954-1968, with four qualifying playoff teams competing in a playoff ladder format. Fourth place will play the third place team. Winner of 4th/3rd faces the second place team, with the winner of that playoff series going into the league championship to face the first place team, which gets an automatic bye into the League Championship round. All playoff series will be a best of seven.

The past two championships have been carried home by first timers. Who will put this season's SPB1 Championship into their trophy cabinet?

Street&Schmoody's 1986 Baseball Yearbook boldly goes out on a limb and predicts two playoff seeding ties. S&S sees the Collierstown Highlanders and the Kenosha Eagles tying for the last AL playoff seed and in the NL, S&S predicts the Bolton Hill Scotties and the Las Vegas Thunder tying for the second place seeding.

Asheville Tourists (NL East 80-82 T3rd). GM Rich Applegate and his Tourists may be turning heads this season after getting another infusion of youth from the draft, one in the outfield and one for the rotation. However, a strong National League means that the Tourists will be contending with a middle group of clubs for a breakeven record. Silver Slugger C Mark Salas (.283/5/56) will handle the majority of the catching load, with TA (Road) Bob Kearney (.284/5/35) expected to be the backup. Steve Yeager (.181/1/7), Donnie Scott (.181/1/13) and Orlando Mercado ('85 DNP) share the pine. The infield will have Brook Jacoby (.263/18/80) at third with Wayne Tolleson (.292/0/25) at shortstop, a platoon of Glenn Hubbard (.218/4/34) and Vance Law (.230/10/51) at second and 1B Alvin Davis (.288/6/79). Harry Spilman (.200/1/7), FA (Mets) Ted Simmons (.262/4/32), and Donnie Hill (.283/2/43) provide the infield bench. With youngsters in the outfield, LF Cory Snyder ('86 2nd round #34), CF Willie McGee (.352/12/121), RF Andy Van Slyke (.237/8/51), these Tourists will be the gazelles with gloves for the foreseeable future as veterans LF George Foster (.279/18/71), and RF Claudell Washington(.226/11/52) will be spotting starters and putting in DH duty along with Ernest Riles (.263/5/52).

The Tourists rotation is headed by runner up NL pitcher of the year, Dave Stieb (18-3/2.38/170k) with Ken Schrom (5-9/4.39/60k), Ron Romanick (9-9/4.55/56k), and lefties Teddy Higuera (12-8/3.62/111k) and rookie Bruce Ruffin ('86 1st round #12) rounding out a confident rotation. Look for FA (Brushbacks) Ed Wojna (2-6/5.98/16k) and FA (Mets) Matt Keough (0-2/4.61/12k) to get some spot starts. The Tourists will rely on a very deep bullpen featuring Craig Lefferts (3-7/3.14/45k/2sv), Ken Dayley (2-6/4.70/42k/6sv), Frank DiPino (5-5/4.64/41k/6sv), Bill Dawley (2-3/3.27/38k/7sv), Gene Walter (0-0/1.35/10k/6sv) and Bob Shirley (5-3/3.71/37k). Look for a closer amongst one of the bullpen hurlers. The Tourists may have begun their journey to respectability and GM Applegate will be pushing his team to get comfortably over the .500 mark for the first time since the 1980 season.

Beast Coast Brushbacks (NL East 53-109 6th). GM Chris Longo has nowhere to look but up, as a youth movement has begun for this once proud franchise that hasn't sniffed the playoffs since 1964. Mike Sciosia (.286/8/44) and Charlie Moore (.255/0/16) will be the catching duo. 3B Paul Molitor (.262/4/63) will have a full season to prove himself. SS Tony Fernandez (.256/1/34) and 2B Julio Franco (.275/12/74) provide one of the league's more potent keystone combinations. Don Baylor (.247/17/55) will probably split first base duties with Gorman Thomas (.209/27/70) and Larry Sheets (.213/9/43) along with DH duties. The flash and dazzle will come from the starting outfielders. LF Mel Hall (.265/0/9), CF Eric Davis (.213/4/11), and RF Jose Canseco (.279/3/12) will provide the Brushbacks a vast outfield offense and defense improvement over last season. Maybe enough to get this team close to .500 if these three bop and run just on their biceps and thighs. Candy Maldonado (.196/0/18) and Pat Sheridan (.191/0/14) will provide DH and spot outfield duty. Darnell Coles (.304/1/12), and rookies Fred Manrique ('86 6th round #112), and Luis Aguayo ('86 draft 9th round #178) back up the infield.

The rotation will be a challenge for GM Longo with only three reliable starters Mike LaCoss (2-1/4.70/26k), Charles Hudson (3-15/4.76/71k) and Steve Trout (4-16/7.08/43k). Rookies Bob Kipper (2-0/4.70/7k) and Kelly Downs ('86 3rd round #46), along with veterans Larry McWilliams (8-7/3.48/48k) and Rick Langford (2-4/4.85/23k) will make up for the rest of the rotation. The bullpen will rely on Bud Black (12-6/4.07/109k), Ron Robinson (5-5/5.40/73k), Dave Schmidt (1-6/2.09/27k/13sv), Brad Havens (0-3/10.47/21k), Rod Scurry (0-2/2.72/57k), and Dickie Noles (0-3/4.38/53k) to fill in the innings to closer Tim Burke (2-2/2.11/55/2sv). Depending on how high this offense flies and how effective the pitching staff can be will determine how much improvement there will be for the Brushbacks. The Brushbacks had an NL worst ERA (4.86), most walks (623), hits given up (1675) and most runs given up (885). The Brushbacks will need to vastly improve their pitching if they want to end that twenty-two season playoff drought. 75 wins is not out of the question for this club.

Bloomington Hoosiers (AL West 109-53 1st). GM Steve Lehman has seen the World Series the past two seasons. Will the Hoosiers return for another engagement? The Hoosiers not only topped the league last season in wins, batting average, and OPS, but was the only AL team to top 900 runs. This team returns a core that will more than likely put them atop the American League with the best record. Ozzie Virgil (.232/32/90) and Bill Schroeder (.233/10/30) will again share the catching duties, but do not look for Virgil to repeat last season's power numbers. Rookie Ron Karkovice ('86 2nd round #43) will be looking to replace one of the starters sometime in the near future. The infield will also be the same as last season's with 3B Ken Oberkfell (.280/6/47), the 'Wizard of Oz' Gold Glove winning SS Ozzie Smith (.232/8/52), reliable 2B Ryne Sandberg (.293/18/89) and smooth fielding Gold Glove winning 1B Keith Hernandez (.313/21/132). Ken Phelps (.187/5/22), Tim Flannery (.288/1/28), and Kelly Gruber (.143/0/0) will provide the hurrahs from the bench. The Hoosiers outfield boast four of the best with Gold Glove LF Kevin McReynolds (.259/17/73), a platoon of CF Robin Yount (.267/11/56) and Brett Butler (.302/7/63) and Silver Slugger RF Tony Gwynn (.345/4/98). DH Keith Moreland (.322/11/64), along with bench riders Tony Walker ('86 draft 8th round #175) and Randy Ready (.272/2/25) fill out the rest of this upcoming powerhouse.

GM Lehman has perhaps the league's deepest pitching staff. Headed up by Brett Saberhagen (19-5/2.42/144k), Charlie Leibrandt (13-4/3.24/97k), Dennis Martinez (11-4/3.31/73k), Ron Guidry (10-3/4.30/71k), Tim "Turn On, Tune In, Drop Out" Leary (2-1/2.73/19k), Dave Dravecky (8-2/3.40/57k), and Bruce Hurst (9-11/4.04/150k). GM Lehman will probably end up using a dart and a dartboard filling out the rotation. Those who don't start will be expected to fill the bullpen with effective innings. CL Greg Harris (11-3/2.64/74k/28sv) will depend on MR Dale Mahorcic ('86 3rd round #60), Allan Anderson ('86 3rd round #56), Scott Garrelts (3-7/4.83/68k) and Mark Knudson (0-0/4.26/3k) to get the game to the ninth.

These Hoosiers are still the class of the American League with two World Series appearances the past two seasons. Do they have the right stuff to make it to a third straight World Series? Predicted to lead the American League as the #1 seed with 104 victories, it will be hard for any team to keep the Hoosiers from steamrolling over everybody.

Blue Ridge Mountaineers (NL East 96-66 2nd). GM Steve Brunner will be defending the SPB1 World Series title utilizing the workhorses from last season, adding only rookie outfielder Pete Incaviglia to the roster. With only twelve pitchers on the 36 man roster, the Mountaineers will depend upon the mound men that made them champions. The Mountaineers pitching staff posted the lowest ERA in the SPB1 (3.28), gave up the fewest walks (411) and tossed the most shutouts (18) and also led in quality starts (106). The staff may be another year older but also maybe, wiser. SPs (by age) Don Sutton (8-8/3.72/88k 1 no-hitter), Charlie Hough (13-8/2.93/89k), Bert Blyleven (9-12/3.20/113k), Bob Knepper (14-6/4.24/72k) will be the front four, while Ken Dixon (9-4/3.55/46k), Zane Smith (6-5/3.58/59k) and Scott Sanderson (11-2/1.56/82k) will battle for the fifth spot with the losers going into the relief pen. This staff is a really deep one and the Mountaineers could opt for a six man rotation. Closing combo Willie Hernandez (3-3/2.88/41k/24sv) and Dan Quisenberry (9-5/1.58/34k/16sv) will be the anchors of the bullpen, while those who do not make the rotation will be piling on the long and middle innings, along with Jerry Reuss (7-5/4.14/52k), Joe Boever (1-0/8.00/20k) and Ed Olwine ('86 draft 5th round #110).

A veteran lineup is led by C Bob Boone (.226/1/20), another old-timer catching old-timers. The infield will be seasoned and ready to run it back with 1B Eddie Murray (.298/32/126), 2B Frank White (.255/21/67), SS Greg Gagne (.238/4/20), and 3B Gary Gaetti (.230/13/55). OFs Gary Ward (.327/11/54) and Gary Matthews (.185/7/31) will share left field. Gary Pettis (.258/0/29) owns center field and look for rookie Pete Incaviglia ('86 draft 1st round #22) pushing Tony Armas (.266/19/61) into DH duties unless Mr. Armas' arm and defense keeps him on the field and Pete DHing. Dwayne Murphy (.249/12/54) and TA (Thunder) Brian Harper (.270/1/8), and Bill Almon (.247/6/16) will be the outfield bench. John Stefero ('85 DNP) is the primary backup catcher, and TA (Black Sox) Cliff Johnson (.272/3/33), FA (Triangles) Jason Thompson (.259/12/68), Steve Lombardozzi (.348/1/14), and Mike Fischlin (.089/0/0) will be providing bench support for the infield. Do these old-timers have the gas to climb the summit once more? Time will tell, but this team is at least one of the four best National League teams and playoff games will be in their future for 1986.

Bolton Hill Scotties (NL West 90-72 1st). GM Marc Unger will again rely on one of the more potent NL offenses and that should be enough for the Scotties to secure one of the four NL playoff seeds for 1986. The Scotties paced the NL in runs (927), (the only SPB1 team with five players scoring 100+ runs), home runs (175), OBP (.364), slugging (.446) and walks (727)(with four batters ranking 1-4 to lead the NL). TA (Lynx) C Jim Sundberg (.254/3/38) will be backed up by Alan Ashby (.280/11/47) and FA (Pelicans) Rick Cerone (.225/1/9). NL batting leader 3B Wade Boggs (.373/7/96) mans the hot corner. Shortstop belongs to Alan Trammell (.263/10/83), while second base may pose the Scotties only weakness. Rookie Jose Oquendo ('85 DNP) and Manny Trillo (.215/2/26) will be the primary platoon, while NL home run and rbi champ, Mike Schmidt (.281/38/145) will take his glove to first. NL stolen base leader LF Tim Raines (.319/13/77) 74 steals highlight a very outstanding outfield, with CF Jesse Barfield (.275/25/90), and RF Dwight Evans (.267/35/117) providing strong gloves and stronger arms. Look for Jorge Orta (.273/6/41), Milt Thompson (.303/0/29), Dusty Baker (.278/8/27) sharing DH duties with TA (Rats) Tony Perez (.262/1/23), Wallace Johnson ('85 DNP) and Jerry Browne ('86 2nd round #38) providing the thump from the bench.

Highlighting the rotation will be 39yr old Nolan Ryan (13-9/4.51/174k) with Tom Candiotti ('85 DNP) and TA (Rats) Bob Ojeda (8-10/2.88/135k) slotting two and three. Eric Show (13-10/3.98/131k), Neil Allen (4-1/3.86/24k), TA (Rats) Don Carman (8-2/1.58/75k 24sv), and Ted Power (7-4/4.72/36k) will fill in the back end of the rotation and provide middle relief. Look for Roger McDowell (6-12/5.58/64k 5sv) and Jeff Reardon (2-5/4.89/36k/26sv) to share the closer role with Juan Berenguer (3-3/4.96/51k) and Steve Crawford (5-4/3.90/61k) in set up roles.

Look for the Scotties to continue being one of the top three teams in the National League.
